

REGULAR MEETING OF THE DEARBORN HEIGHTS CITY COUNCIL

SEPTEMBER 13, 1994

WHEREAS, Unfunded Federal Mandates on State and Local governments have increased significantly in recent years and costs our City thousands of taxpayer's dollars each year;

WHEREAS, A need exists to educate the public of the impact unfunded Federal mandates have on our community;

WHEREAS, Unfunded Federal mandates require our City to carry out their requirements, without their consideration of local circumstances, costs, or capacity and subject us to civil or criminal penalties for noncompliance;

WHEREAS, Intrusions by Federal government through unfunded mandates, distort local priorities and often result in higher local taxes and/or reduced local services;

WHEREAS, Unfunded Federal mandates may be based on noble intentions, however, local governments are increasingly challenged to finance additional monitoring, control technology, infrastructure improvements and retroactive environmental cleanups, etc.;

WHEREAS, This body recognizes that not all unfunded Federal mandates are bad, we are opposed to having the entire financial burden placed upon the backs of local government to effectuate a mandate by the Federal government;

WHEREAS, This body is not opposed to clean air, clean water, safe landfills, etc. we are opposed to the way the mandates are passed without concern or consideration of the impact on Local Governments and without direct local input;

NOW, THERE BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Dearborn Heights, by their City Council, calls for an end to the Federal Government's practice of imposing, but not funding, costly programs, that local governments are required to carry out.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Dearborn Heights, by their City Council shall make the effort to inform our citizens about the impact of unfunded Federal mandates on our ability to govern and the taxpayers of this community;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the adopted resolution be forwarded to every community in Wayne County requesting they adopt similar resolutions. Copies of this resolution shall be sent to our three Congressional representatives and Senator Carl Levin.

WHEREAS, Water is one of the most essential natural resources; and

WHEREAS, Having safe and clean water is extremely important to the economy of Michigan, as well as, the health and safety of Michigan citizens and the millions of tourists/visitors annually; and

WHEREAS, There are already thousands of serious point pollution sources in Michigan affecting our water supply; and

WHEREAS, There are uncountable non-point pollution sources poisoning our water; and

WHEREAS, There are currently hundreds of injection wells in the State of Michigan including dozens of private (non-commercial) injection wells for hazardous/toxic materials; and

WHEREAS, Injecting hazardous/toxic substances into the ground under pressure is totally unacceptable because the material can go anywhere once it leaves the well, including into our water supply; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City of Dearborn Heights goes on record as being adamantly opposed to injection wells in the State of Michigan and in favor of banning/eliminating all injection wells in the State, and also supports House Bill 5276 banning new commercial injection wells as a first, small step towards a goal of eliminating threats to our water quality.

WHEREAS, Kiwanis Club of Dearborn Heights and its 225 sister clubs throughout Michigan also contributes funds to help support special children programs at the C.S. Mott Children's Hospital (Ann Arbor), Mary Free Bed Hospital and Rehabilitation Center (Grand Rapids), Northern Michigan Hospitals (Petoskey), and the Charles W. Shull Project, which provides coloring books and crayons to hospitalized children -- including those at Oakwood Hospital; and,

WHEREAS, in addition to the Kiwanis Club of Dearborn Heights providing monetary contributions, individual Kiwanians also participate in the fund raising activities of organizations such as the Salvation Army, Dearborn/Dearborn Heights Association for the Retarded -- and, of course, the Dearborn Heights Goodfellows; and,
