The Public Hearing for the FY 2001 Local Law Enforcement Block Grant was called to order at 8:21 p.m. by Council Chairwoman Margaret M. Horvath.

Council Chairwoman Horvath asked Deputy Clerk Pawlukiewicz to read the official notice of the Public Hearing.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a Public Hearing will be held on Tuesday November 13, 2001, by the Dearborn Heights City Council at the Administrative Offices, 6045 Fenton, Dearborn Heights, Michigan, at 8:00 p.m., for the purpose of hearing comments to the FY 2001 Local Law Enforcement Block Grant and the programs targeted for the grant monies.

This Notice is published by direction of the City Council under and by virtue of the City Clerk.

Written comments may be directed to the City Clerk's Office, 6045 Fenton, Dearborn Heights, MI 48127. Joyce A. Robbins, City Clerk, published in the official newspaper of record on November 1 and November 8, 2001.

Council Chairwoman Horvath acknowledged Police Chief Gust.

Police Chief Gust "The Police Department is in line to get another federal grant from the Local Law Enforcement Grant Fund. As part of the requirement from the federal government we have to have a Public Hearing. We went through a committee meeting that Lt. Knezek presented and for the public he has to show us what we are going to buy with this money. So I'll turn it over to Lt. Dave Knezek of our Research and Development team."

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Lt. Knezek "Good evening, again I am here to inform the Council and also the people in attendance of our 2001 Local Law Enforcement Block Grant funds and how we purpose to spend them. The block grant funds are a federal project through the federal government where they allocate funding to law enforcement agencies to help acquire technology, personnel and things of that nature. What I always like to do is go back a step and tell you what we have done in the past. Last year I stood before this body and told you what we wanted to do with the funds that were given to us by the federal government and where those projects are at. Last year we purchased four (4) mobile data computers and those units have been installed in the cars. We now have a total of 19 police vehicles that have mobile data computers in the car. We acquired three (3) records work stations, which is basically a computer system which is going to hook into our CLEMIS main access server for our CAD and Records Management Program. We also purchased three (3) CAD work stations and we have been working with Wayne County and their Geographical Information Systems right now to finalize all of our mapping programs so that we can get that up and going. We are looking probably at the first of the year to changing over to a new CAD and Records System with CLEMIS, which is out of Oakland County.

The GIS portion is instrumental in helping with locating where runs and calls for service are. We will also be equipping our cars with AVL equipment, which is Automatic Vehicle Locators so our dispatchers will be able to look at a map and see exactly where all our scout cars are located so we can best put our resources where we need them or if we have a call for service we can look at a map and instantly see which unit is the closest to the scene.

Our funds this year from the federal government, our Local Law Enforcement Block Grant, we received a total of \$58,732.00. The Block Grant requires a 10% match from the City of the total funds, our portion of the 10% match totals \$6,526.00, which gives us a total block grant with the matching fund of \$65,258.00. What we would like to do with the funds this year is to continue with the Mobile Data Project. As I stated earlier we have nineteen cars that currently are using them. I know the Mayor has seen them. We had a presentation a week or two ago, Tim was part of that and was there. We took them out in the cars and actually showed them how they work, how fast the computers are, we type in a name, we hit send and within seconds we are getting the information back, if this person is wanted, if a vehicle is stolen, if they have warrants, what their driving status is. This information comes back to the officers in seconds. Once we get completely done, if this project is approved we will have a total of twenty-two (22) units in service. That will give us 16 patrol cars that will be equipped with Mobile Data computers; one (1) patrol supervisors unit equipped and five (5) traffic units equipped with Mobile Data computers.

One other project that we would like to use the funding for is a Mug Shot Imaging System. We currently have a Live-Scan Fingerprint device which takes the fingerprints from anybody brought in as an arrest. We would take a photo of them and it's stored digitally sent up to CLEMIS. Again, it's part of their data base and stored on their servers. We don't have to worry about buying the equipment to store here. It gets sent over a key one line up to CLEMIS, we don't have the cost of maintaining that type of equipment. What we can also do with this is it will also shot us out, on a booking card when we have a suspect that gets arrested it will also be able to put a photo on that booking card so we can match up the name and the photo. This will also interface with the Live Scan unit, with the fingerprint device that will enable an officer to go back and type in the information once, he'll put in the persons name, address and such and it will then take it over to the Live Scan device and it will also populate in the fingerprint card.

With this imaging device it's really impressive. We are able to type in a persons name and search the data base at CLEMIS. By demographics we can put in height, weight, sex and things like that and search the data base. Currently CLEMIS has over 250,000 images on their data base and it's growing because everybody that's on the system, which is all the Oakland agencies, six agencies in Wayne County and seven agencies in Macomb County now. They are all putting information into the system, basically anybody placed in the Metro Detroit area, if you had a photo taken we are going to be able to get a copy of that mug shot. It also gives us the ability to

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do digital photo line-ups. Again, this is where the demographics come into play. We can type in heights, weight, race, sex and come up with images and actually compile photo line ups for our detectives to use whenever they have a witness they want to have them look at a line up. It definitely will be a time saving device and it will also help with people who give us bogus names.

This is our proposed budget, again we have a total of \$65,258.00. The cost of the Mobile Date project is \$30,355.86 and we have a projected cost on the imaging device of approximately \$35,000.00. I haven't gotten an exact figure yet they are in the process of getting a new vendor for that project. The figure I'm using has been derived from what other agencies have purchased and what their costs were on purchasing that equipment. Does anyone have any questions? Thank you very much."

The Public Hearing for the Section 8 Voucher Program was called to order at 8:30 p.m. by Council Chairwoman Margaret M. Horvath.

Council Chairwoman Horvath asked Deputy Clerk Pawlukiewicz to read the official notice of the Public Hearing.

The Dearborn Heights Housing Commission has developed its Agency Plan in compliance with the Quality Housing and Work Responsibility Act of 1998. It is available for review after September 13, 2001 at the Community Development Department located at 26155 Richardson, Dearborn Heights, Michigan, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

In addition, a public hearing will be held on November 13, 2001 in the Dearborn Heights City Council Chambers located at 6045 Fenton, Dearborn Heights, Michigan at 8:00 p.m.. Everyone is invited. Published September 13, 2001.

Council Chairwoman Horvath acknowledged Community Development Director Oliverio.

Community Development Director Oliverio "As you may know the City of Dearborn Heights is working with the Plymouth Housing Commission on our Section 8 Rental Assistance Program. Through the last several years Dearborn Heights along with the Plymouth Housing Commission has been able to help out hundreds of families find safe and decent housing in our City and neighboring communities. Many of these families that we have helped out are families, it's not just for senior citizens, there are a lot of three, four and five family units that we are processing. HUD has mandated that on a yearly basis we prepare an Agency Plan, to let the people know and HUD know how both agencies are working and how our plans are solidified. Tonight we have Sharon Thomas, Plymouth Housing Commission Director; Eleanor Gnatek, from my department and Kathy Swarthout, the Section 8 Coordinator here. Kathy will give you a quick overview of our Agency Plan."

Kathy Swarthout "Thank you very much. Good evening everyone. We have been coming the last several years to take any questions or answer anything that you might want to know about the Section 8 Rental Assistance Program. Over the years with our great partnership with Carmine and Eleanor we have been able to develop a real solid Agency Plan. The goals have remained pretty much consistent; help as many families as we possibly can; allow them the freedom to live and work in areas, we're glad to say more and more families are moving out to

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the suburbs and are melding into the Dearborn Heights, Dearborn and surrounding communities. We have also initiated a new program called Welfare to Work. On the Welfare to Work Program aside from providing our families with just the assistance with their rent we are also in the process of establishing support services so that any barriers that they have to becoming successful and self sufficient can be addressed, worked on and eliminated. So eventually we can have a roll over program. They come on for a short time, use it as a stop gap measure and they move on to self sufficiency. In our Agency Plan we address the Welfare to Work Program, we also have a program called the Mainstream Program and that targeted population are disabled individuals. Many have children. They are either physically challenged or mentally challenged and they have a lot of issues in finding appropriate housing to meet their specific needs. And then we have a regular program where we assist families, seniors, veterans. We are one of the few communities in the area that decided we would give a preference to persons on our waiting list that were honorably discharged veterans and it is extremely appropriate in this day and age, but we have had it for a number of years, at least 10 or 15 years. So essentially I am just here tonight if anyone has any questions on the Agency Plan. It has been at the Community Development building for the last 45 days, if anyone had the opportunity to go over and read it and has any questions or comments I would be glad to address those now."

Jerry Kowal, 5971 Whitefield "On several occasions when I've come here I have had concerns for I guess you say low income. That can mean a lot of things and people invest in their homes a lot of money and hard work. We're always concerned, well I'm concerned, that you bring in I guess I may as well as it, kind of undesirable people. I am trying to say it delicately, but I have that concern. When you mention HUD, HUD is not one of my favorites because it has had a very bad reputation for many years. That has been my concern in the City. People invest a lot of money. A lot of these things that you talk about sound very nice and they probably are but that is my big concern about certain people coming in that may be undesirable and not keep up the property and things like that. So that is my concern."

Ms. Swarthout "Actually sir, that is an extremely valid concern. Unfortunately it is a general misconception of the program itself. HUD does have a somewhat tarnished reputation as far as their administrative abilities however, they establish with the assistance of Congress the rules and regulations that govern this particular program. The Dearborn Heights and the Plymouth Housing Commission are charged with making sure that the administration of it, the rules and regulations are followed. There are probably numerous families in your community that are on the Section 8 Program and you're not even aware of it. The reason that is so is because we provide about 70% of their rent through the Housing Commission and they are only charged with paying about 30% of that. That is an extreme amount of money for low income families but in exchange for that they are responsible to abide by the rules and regulations of the program. Also we have a very strong landlord base. If you have a strong landlord who cares for his property and takes care of his property and makes repairs and maintenance on a timely manner the partnership between a tenant who needs this and is willing to comply with the rules and regulations with a landlord who is a strong assertive landlord who takes care of his property and initiates his ability to get rid of undesirable tenants has cleaned up the program considerably. HUD has given more authority to the landlords to police their own units and be select and screen their own tenants. That aspect of the program has gotten stronger over the years so the quality of tenants that come on the program and stay on the program, I won't lie to you we get some that are on and off, they are on for maybe less than a year in some instances and violate the rules and regulations of the program and the result of that violation they are terminated and we go to the next family on the list. A very valid complaint or concern."

Community Development Director "I just want to say a few things. First of all we don't go out asking people to come in for low income housing or for rental assistance. They fill out an application and if they qualify they find their own home it doesn't necessarily have to be in Dearborn Heights. Like Kathy said many of our people you don't even know about are getting some of their rent paid because they are having trouble trying to make ends meet. Again the low

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income definition isn't low income as we knew it 10, 15 or 20 years ago. Kathy, do you off hand know say what a family of four is considered low income?

Kathy Swarthout "I'm not 100% sure because they were just raised and I haven't gotten them yet from the Department of HUD. A family of four would be somewhere in the \$27,000 to \$28,000 a year range."

Community Development Director Oliverio "And that's what we are talking about as low income. I want everybody to understand that we don't go out soliciting people to rent homes in our City. It's up to them to find the home that fits their need, and like Kathy said to find a landlord that participates in the program. I just want to make sure everybody to understand the statement about low income it's not like that. It's not like the HUD program in the 70's or early 80's."

Councilman Constan "What percentage of the assistance, if you can say so, is short term assistance say two years or less? Is it 50%, 20%, 80%?"

Kathy Swarthout "That is a difficult statistic because of the onset of the new programs and the make up of it. Obviously the targeted populations are senior citizens and disabled individuals are pretty much on it forever. Once they get on, as long as they abide by the rules and regulations and they are income eligible for subsidiary, there are no time limits. They can stay on it for as long as the need is there. We're really happy to say that the turnover time with the families is getting greater. It is more difficult to keep our numbers up because we have such a turnover but a lot of people are coming to us and they're just maybe a few credits short of completing a degree or they are in a study program or they have agreed to participate in the Welfare to Work Program, and that's a five year program and so they're on and they get a better paying job or they acquire the skills necessary to become self sufficient and they go off. The family aspect of it as far as the work initiative has only been a year and a half in the making so we don't really know what impact it's going to have. The majority of the people I would say there term on it and families is somewhere between three to five years and for seniors and disabled considerably longer."

Councilman Constan "And you may not know this also, what percentage are in single family residential homes and what percentage are in apartments or something other than single family residential homes?"

Kathy Swarthout "I would say right now approximately 50% are in single family homes, probably 20% are in your traditional apartment complex environment and the other 30% are scattered between row houses, townhouses, flats and even mobile homes that are available for rent."

Council Chairwoman Horvath asked if there were any more questions or comments, hearing none, she asked for a motion to close the public hearing.
